Part 1: Preparing my Arrival



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IMMIGRATION

Can I come to study on Oxford campus?

Only individuals who do not need to apply for a visa can study on the Oxford campus.

These individuals are considered as Non-Visa Nationals. They automatically obtain the Standard Visitor Visa (without needing to apply beforehand) and will have Standard Visitor status for the duration of their stay.

As such, they will be allowed to study in the UK for a maximum of 6 months. They must be able to present a valid biometric passport for the duration of their stay and prove that they will leave the country at the end of the authorized period (return train or plane ticket). All European countries are considered Non-Visa Nationals, as well as other countries like the USA, Liechtenstein or Switzerland.

Students from countries on this [list](#) will not be able to study on our campus as they are considered as Visa Nationals.

As a Standard Visitor

As a standard visitor, you cannot work in the UK or claim public funds such as housing benefits or Universal credit.

ETA: **E**lectronic **T**ravel **A**uthorisation

From April 2025, an ETA is now required to enter the UK. The ETA is different from the visa, and you have to apply to obtain it.

The ETA is valid for 2 years and allows you to come to the UK for up to 6 months.

It costs 16£ to apply for an ETA and we recommend you use the ETA app or online through gov.uk.

As a Standard Visitor, you do not need to pay the immigration health surcharge. If you have a valid EHC (European Health Insurance Card) issued by an EU country, Norway, Iceland, Liechtenstein, or Switzerland, you can access medically necessary treatment during your stay.

Prior to your departure and in your country, ask for your European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). In France: EHIC is free, and application for it should be sent at least 20 days before your departure date: <https://www.service-public.fr/particuliers/vosdroits/F34441>



Having access to the healthcare system does not mean that you won't have to pay for some medical procedures. Please check the 'Travel Insurance' section ([p9](#))

Plus note that in the UK, patients need to pay toward the cost of:

- Prescriptions,
- Dental care,
- Eye care.



We advise you to search for a GP and register as a new patient as soon as possible and prior to your arrival in Oxford. Delays to get registered as a new patient can be very long, so it is better to anticipate.

NHS: 111

If you don't have any GPs prior to your arrival in Oxford, you can dial **111** or use the website to get help for your symptoms ([Get help for your symptoms - NHS 111](#))

If you do not take the preliminary step of registering with a doctor, we strongly recommend that you obtain a UK phone number. NHS services (111) do not return calls to non-UK numbers, which may make it difficult for you to access medical assistance other than by going directly to a hospital (Please refer to section 'Telephone & internet', **p25**)

Medical Apps

Certain medical apps allow you to book appointments online with doctors, often for the same day. Please note that consultations are subject to a fee, as are any prescriptions issued.

As you might be asked to pay for some medical procedures, The British government always advice visitors to the UK to take out travel or health insurance. This means that you might be able to reclaim any healthcare costs you are required to pay in the UK from your insurer. This also means that you will be able to get repatriated if needed or covered within the framework of civil liability if you have subscribed for these options.

The minimum coverage of such an insurance must be:

- The coverage of health expenses,
- The coverage in case of repatriation,
- The coverage within the framework of civil liability.

Some insurance policies also cover:

- Loss of papers (ID, passport, driving license...),
- Loss of luggage,
- Travel cancellation,
- Juridic assistance,
- Assistance in the event of death.

We strongly recommend that you take out this type of supplementary insurance. It is even more required for those with a pre-existing health condition. For those ones, speak to your doctor for advice before you travel and make plans for how to care for your condition when you are in the UK. If required, bring a letter with your medical condition description and the medication you are taking.

You can first check with your insurance to make sure that it proposes you the necessary coverage you will need during your stay in the UK.

Or you can use any other insurance companies depending on your needs.

ACCOMMODATION

We advise you to start looking for an accommodation as early as possible. And even if you are in a rush, take your time to read the contract properly, for instance make sure that your accommodation will be furnished.

Right to Rent in the UK

As a non-national, full-time student, staying in the UK for less than 6 months, **you won't have to provide your landlord with a share- code to prove your right to rent in the UK.**

You will only need a biometric passport, evidence of your student's status and evidence of entry to the UK (Train or plane tickets + school certificate available on WARD)

In case of problem with your prospective landlord, please refer them to page 46 of the [Landlord's Guide to Right to Rent checks document \(pdf\)](#).

Find a Guarantor

A guarantor is not compulsory, but it may make it easier for you to pay your rent monthly.

Who can be my guarantor?

- ✓ **Private companies** which propose different services (see online)
- ✓ **Parents and family members**: parents or family members are often the first choice as guarantors for students. They are expected to have a stable financial situation.

Some landlords may ask you to pay the 6 months' rent in one payment as a guarantee. We discourage you of doing it.

Deposit

There are 2 types of deposit:

- ✓ **A tenancy deposit**

Since 1 June 2019, there has been a cap on the deposit that the tenant is required to pay at the start of the tenancy. If the total annual rent is less than £ 50 000, the maximum deposit is 5 weeks' rent.

The deposit must be protected during the tenancy.

- ✓ **A holding deposit** to reserve a property. It is capped at no more than 1 week's rent.

Both deposits must be refundable at the end of the tenancy period, usually subject to the rent being paid and the property remaining in good condition.

Non-Permitted Fees

The government's guidance on the Tenant Fees Act contains information about the fees that letting agents and landlords are prohibited to charge tenants.

Here is the list:

- ✓ **Viewing fees** – any charge for viewing the property.
- ✓ **Tenancy set- up fees** – any charge for setting up the tenancy or contracts.
- ✓ **Check out fees** – any charge for leaving the property.
- ✓ **Third party fees** - any charge for actions done by someone other than the landlord or the tenant but that the landlord must pay for.

Home Insurance

Home insurance on a rental property isn't compulsory as a tenant, but there's still an argument for having some cover in place.

Tenants Contents Insurance: covers your personal possessions in case of fire, theft, accidental damage or other insured risk.

Tenants Liability Insurance: covers accidental damage to items your landlord provides for you to use.

Watch out for Scams

Some landlords may pressure you to take their accommodation. Be cautious, as unfortunately there are always scams.

Here are some points of vigilance to keep in mind:

- ✓ Avoid exchanges solely through messages or WhatsApp. You should speak with your interlocutor. Similarly, do not send your banking details via message. You should have a signed contract detailing what you will pay and how.
- ✓ Ask your interlocutor to see the accommodation beforehand (in person if you can travel for a weekend or via video). Don't sign anything before seeing the accommodation.
- ✓ Don't agree to pay the entire amount due at once, even if you don't have a guarantor. Try to renegotiate and lower the amount as much as possible by offering other guarantees (bank statements from a family member for instance)
- ✓ Verify online the information provided by your interlocutor (professional contacts, address of the accommodation on Google maps, verifying the phone number by calling, asking former students...)



Landlords and agents must be registered, so you can ask for their registration number.

Finding the right accommodation is an important part of your EM Normandie Oxford experience. Start your search as early as possible to increase your chances of finding the accommodation that suits you.



ESSENTIALS FOR YOUR SUITCASE

Electronic Equipment

- Make sure to bring an adapter so you can plug your devices into UK sockets.
- It's also a good idea to bring extension leads—this will save you from needing one adapter per device.
- For students using MAC computers, please come to campus already equipped with an adapter that allows you to plug in a USB stick.
- A USB device will allow you to connect to our printer and print documents when needed (for example, when handing in assignments to teachers)

Clothing

- Make sure to pack a formal outfit for the opening ceremony at the Town Hall (dress code: black tie).
- Bring sportswear, especially if you'd like to take part in the activities organized throughout the year by the BDS.
- Don't forget a Christmas jumper for the end-of-year celebrations.

Health & Medical Supplies

- Remember to bring a basic first aid kit, including a thermometer.
- For those on regular medication, make sure you have enough for the entire duration of your stay. You should also bring any necessary documentation required for travel.

MOVING INTO MY HOME

Check the Paperwork

When you've found your place, you must check the documentation related to your accommodation pretty the same way as in France.

✓ **The tenancy agreement:** make sure you have a written tenancy agreement and read it carefully to understand your rights and responsibilities before you sign it. The landlord or agent usually provide one, but you can ask them to consider using a different version instead. If you have any concerns about the agreement, seek advice before you sign it.

✓ **Inventory:** agree an inventory (or check-in report) with your landlord before you move in, and as an extra safeguard, make sure you take photos. This will make things easier if there is a dispute about the deposit at the end of the tenancy.

If you are happy with the inventory, sign it and keep a form.

✓ **Meter readings:** remember to make meter readings when you move in. Take a photo showing the meter reading and the date and time, if possible. This will help make sure you don't pay for the previous tenant's bills.

✓ **Contact details:** make sure you have the correct contact details for the landlord or agent, including a telephone number you can use in case of emergency. You are legally entitled to know the name and address of your landlord.

Things the Landlord must provide you with

Please note first that the landlord is required to provide you with all these documents free of charge and before or at the time of your move-in.

✓ **A copy of the guide** 'How to rent: the checklist for renting in England', either as a hard copy or, with your agreement, via email as a PDF attachment.

✓ **A gas safety certificate** before you occupy the property. They must also give you a copy of the new certificate after each annual safety check if there is a gas installation or appliance.

✓ **Deposit paperwork.** If you have provided a deposit, the landlord must protect it in a government approved scheme within 30 days and give you a prescribed information about it. Make sure that you understand how you will get your money back at the end of the tenancy. Keep this information safe as you will need it later.

✓ **The energy performance certificate**, which contains the energy performance rating of the property you are renting, free of charge at the onset of your tenancy. As of April 2020, all the privately rented properties must have an energy performance rating of E or above before being let out.

✓ **A report that shows the condition of the property's electrical installations**. The landlord also has to give this to the local council if they ask for it. National electrical safety standards must be met, and inspection must be done every 5 years.

✓ **Evidence that smoke and monoxide alarms** are working order at the start of the tenancy. Tenants should be regularly check they are working.

Things the Landlord must do

- ✓ Maintain the structure and exterior of the property.
- ✓ Ensure the property is free from serious hazards throughout the tenancy.
- ✓ Fit smoke alarms on every floor and carbon monoxide alarms in rooms with fixed combustion appliances such as boilers, and make sure they are working from the start of the tenancy. If they are not there, ask your landlord to install them.
- ✓ Deal with any problems with the water, electricity and gas supply.
- ✓ Maintain any appliances and furniture they have supplied.
- ✓ Carry out most repairs. If something is not working, report it to your landlord or agent as soon as you can.
- ✓ Arrange an annual gas safety check by a Gas Safe engineer, where there are any gas appliances.
- ✓ Arrange an annual electrical safety check by a qualified and competent person every five years.
- ✓ Seek your permission to access your home and give at least 24 hours' notice of proposed visits like repairs. These visits should take place at reasonable times – neither the landlord nor the letting agent is entitled to enter your home without your express permission.

Things the Tenant must do

- ✓ **Pay the rent on time**. If your rent is more than 14 days late, you could be liable for a default fee.
- ✓ **Pay any other bills** that you are responsible for on time, such as council tax, gas, electricity, and water bills.

✓ **Look after the property.** Get landlord's permission before attempting repairs or decorating. Contact your landlord promptly to report any damage inside or outside the property.

✓ **Be considerate to the neighbours.** Anti- social behaviour may be a reason for your landlord to evict you.

✓ **Don't take any lodger or sub- let** without checking whether you need the permission from your landlord.

Shall I pay the Council Tax?

As a full-time student, you will not have to pay it.

However, you will still need to apply for an exemption ("tax exemption"). This application is individual, even if you are living with other students.

The exemption application is usually done online. You will receive mail at your home sometime after your move-in, which will indicate where and how to make this application. Do not ignore these letters: they are important.

You will need to provide a certificate of enrolment to justify your student status. This certificate will be available at the beginning of the academic year on WARD.

LIFE IN OXFORD

Bank Account

There is no use to open a bank account in the UK.

Most of our students choose an online bank to open an account, which is easier and cheaper.

If you need to change some money, it is much better to go to a post office (no commission)

Telephone & Internet

Most of the time, the Wi-Fi is included within the accommodation.

Check if it is already included in your bills or if you have to pay an extra charge to access it.

Students have access to a free Wi-Fi on the campus premises (see section 'Services on campus', **p36**)

However, **we strongly recommend that you obtain a SIM card with a UK phone number**. This may be particularly useful if you need to contact emergency or healthcare services. Several providers offer digital SIM cards (eSIMs), allowing you to keep your current phone.


Eating

There is a cafeteria on the campus. You can access it only with your lanyard from 8am to 4pm, Monday to Friday.

A shopping centre, WESTGATE, is located 3 minutes' walk from the campus:

The city centre is located 12 minutes' walk from the campus, 4 minutes by bike.



Getting Around the City

The EM Normandie campus is in the heart of the city and is very easily accessible. Moreover, as the city centre is not very extensive, you can easily get around on foot.

Bicycle:

It is the preferred and most used means of transport in Oxford.

You will have access to a bike garage on campus.

You can get a bicycle upon your arrival by checking out the many second-hand bike websites ("preloved bikes").

Bus:

Buses run every 10 minutes in the morning and on average every 20 minutes during the day. Note that traffic in Oxford can be very heavy during peak hours.

The integration team will offer you a series of entertaining and cultural activities during the first week of semester 1. We usually call this special moment **the Welcome Week**.


All the Welcome Week activities are designed to help you discover the city and foster strong bonds of camaraderie among students from different promotions.


